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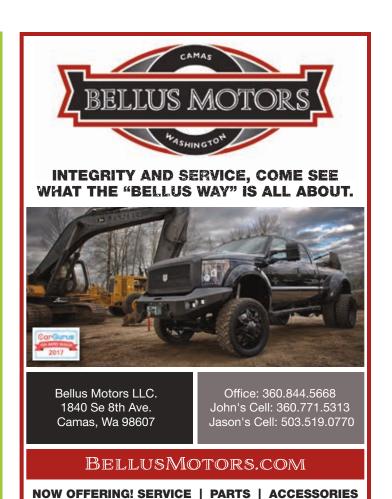
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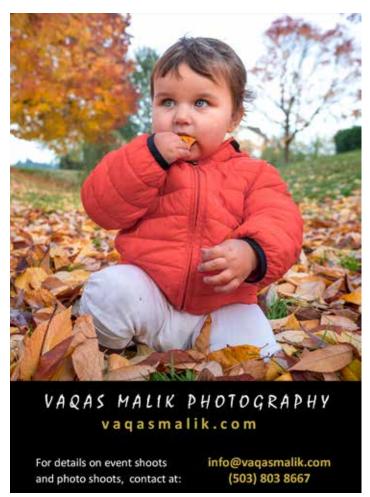




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meet your neighbors

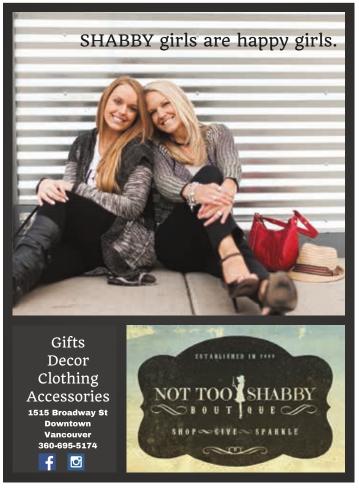

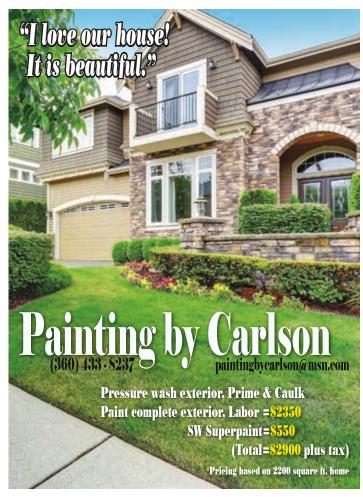

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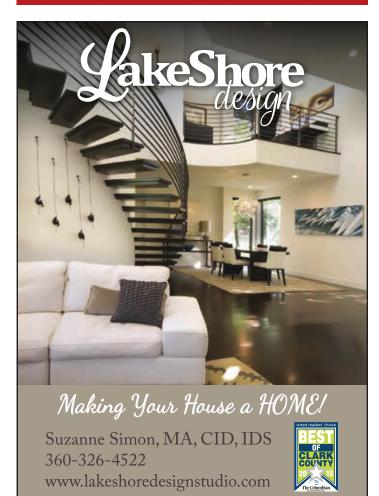

British Columbia offers nature at its best and most varied. Granite mountains extend high over deep blue lakes and provide all levels of mountain climbing, hiking, fishing and photographic opportunities. The immense area is famous for its Pacific salmon fishing in both salt and freshwater, with the best months being between May and November. Glacier National Park, Kootenay National Park and The Great Bear Rainforest, among numerous other parks, provide forest exploration and chances to see the elusive Kermode (Spirit) and Grizzly Bears, as well as nesting eagles and other wildlife.

Adventure

A rugged coastline provides for an unexpected surfing excursion at Chesterman Beach. If a little calmer water adventure is something you seek, sailing is plentiful on both the ocean and interior glacier lakes. Challenging bike trails and obstacle courses are set up in the all-seasons resort of Whistler for summertime fun. Try a Via Ferrata tour on Whistler Mountain - a secured rock climbing route up steep peaks where each person is harnessed to the rock by a steel cable and a guide leads you through a suspension bridge. Kicking Horse Mountain Resort offers a day of enjoying whitewater rafting packages, from family-style to deep rumbling rapids to get your heart pumping.

City Lights

Vancouver is Canada's third-largest city and sparkles as the gem of the West. Stanley Park is one of its crowning jewels with over 1000 acres of bountiful beauty to explore. The city is host to beaches for you to sunbathe or even swim in the nearby heated saltwater pool. During the day, check out the Vancouver Aquarium Marine Science Center or the University of British Columbia Museum of Anthropology, If you enjoy shopping, Vancouver

doesn't disappoint! Explore Chinatown, Commercial Drive, Davie Village, Granville Island and Gastown. For the evening, head over to Yaletown where the old warehouse district has been turned into a trendy nighttime hotspot often compared to New York City's SoHo neighborhood.

Make your days a little cooler but a lot more exciting by heading north and checking out the wonders that British Columbia has in store for you!

GET YOUR GRASS reener

Are you always looking at the grass of your neighbors, wondering how they got their grass so green? Before you call a professional landscaping service, enhance your curb appeal by tending to your own lawn.

Water

The best time to water is in the morning to prevent evaporation. Ideally, you want water to penetrate the soil 4-6 inches for optimum results. To determine how far your water is reaching into the soil, water for 30 minutes and then pry out a wedge of soil. Adjust your water time accordingly to reach this desired depth.

Don't Cut Too Short

To determine how long your grass should be, determine your grass type and then select the higher height. Long blades of glass are advantageous because they create shade, prevent weeds from forming, and resist drought conditions, as well as problematic pests.

Fertilize

Lawns thrive on fertilizer to be lush and strengthen their root systems. When you fertilize, use a broadcast spreader. This is better than a drop spreader, which can cause stripes or checkerboard patterns. Broadcast spreaders will distribute fertilizer more consistently for optimum coverage.

Patch Brown Spots

Have some bare spots in your yard? Choose a grass seed that matches your climate. Consider warm weather, cool weather and the amount of shade in your yard. By finding the perfect fit for your yard, grass will thrive and not just

Don't Catch Clippings

Resist the urge to bag your clipped grass. While it makes for a neat and tidy lawn, it isn't in the best interest of your grass. Clippings are beneficial to retain soil moisture and release nutrients into the soil.

Sharpen Your Blades

Do you ever sharpen your blades? Put that on your annual "to do" list. If you see a lawn that is brown on top, it could be that it was mowed with dull blades. Do your lawn a favor and keep your blades sharp.

Follow these tips to get your grass greener and be the envy of your neighbors.

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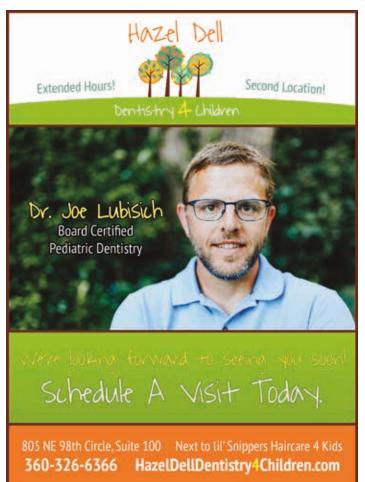
Wishtree

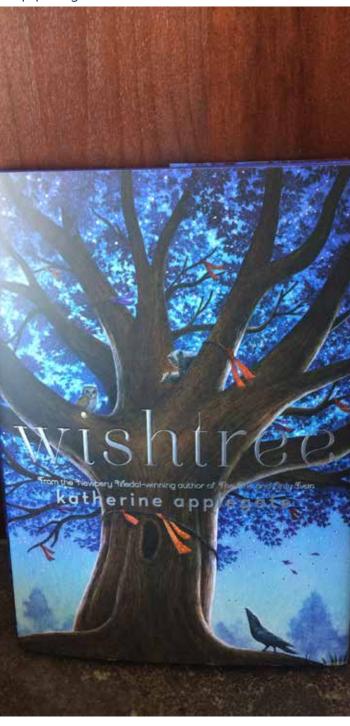

Do you have a signature drink? Why not put it in a smaller glass such as a shooter? By doing so, you will save on your bar tab.



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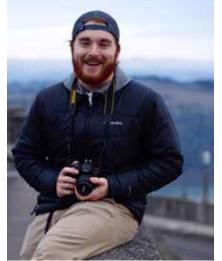

Sporty Or Sports Performance? Coupe Or Sedan?

MANY CHOICES FOR THRILL-SDDKBRS

(And Those Who Just Want To Look The Part)

mong sports coupes, you'll find those that are simply infrom a design standpoint, true performance models and some in-betweens. Sports sedans may be the answer for sports car enthusiasts. Here again, the question is: Are you really looking for sheer performance or just some cool sporty details to set your sedan apart from the average family man's vehicle?



Lexus LC 500

To keep the Lexus performance lineup straight in your mind, it's helpful to know what all those letters stand for. The RC (Racing Coupe) lineup starts with the RC 200T

powered by a 241-hp turbocharged 2.0-liter four-cylinder engine with rear-wheel drive and eight-speed automatic transmission. The RC300 ratchets up the power just a bit to 255-hp with an AWD-only V6, and RC350 with F Sport package gets up to 306 hp, adding a Sport S+ driving mode. The F Sport package is not to be confused with Lexus models badged with a single F (which refers to Fuji Speedway). With the F, you've reached the level you must aspire to if it's a true performance coupe that you're seeking. The V8-powered RC F gets 467-hp from a 5.0-liter V8 and starts at around \$64K. The handsome all-new 2018 Lexus LC (Luxury Coupe) 500, adds another viable choice among Lexus performance coupes. The LC 500 sports the same 5.0-liter V8 as found in the RCF but is paired with a new 10-speed automatic RWD transmission good for 471 hp. The LC's pricing starts at 92K. The LC 500 h also poses to set a bar for what's to come in hybrid performance with a starting price tag of \$96.5K. The Lexus IS (which stands for Intelligent Sports) is considered the RC's sedan analog. The Lexus GS F will also check off all the boxes for Lexus fans in search of both sport and luxury in a sedan, with a V8 engine that outputs 467 horsepower.

Now, let's switch over to look at another brand making waves in the performance arena. The Acura NSX hybrid supercar was Road & Track's Performance Car of the Year for 2017. Going zero to 60 mph in three seconds and hitting 191 mph, its hybrid engine/ electric motor combo with 573 hp sets a new bar. While the NSX will set you back at least \$190K, the TLX A-Spec with SH-AWD (its sedan sister with some NSX traits) will cost you just around

\$46K. Both the exterior and interior get "NSXinspired style treatments and a healthy amount of A-Spec badging. The A-Spec is powered by the same 290-horsepower

3.5-liter V6 as the regular TLX getting 290 hp and 267 lb-ft of torque. Its more dynamic driving experience comes from unique damper settings, a new power steering tune, stiffer brakes, rear stabilizer bars and Michelin 245/40R19 tires. While it's no NSX equivalent from a performance standpoint, it will likely still be sporty and spirited enough for most.

EXERCISE IMPROVES MEMORY

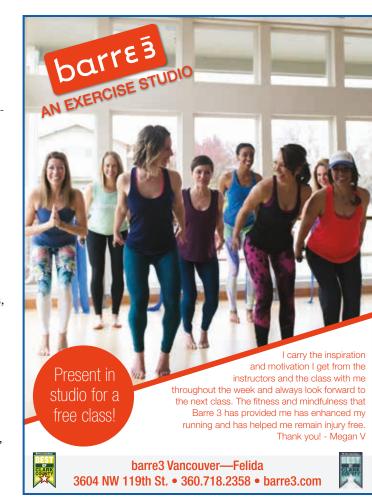

These cookies taste like the chocolate bar Twix was changed into a cookie! They are so delicious!

Ingredients

1½ cups softened butter

1 cup powdered sugar

3 cups flour

1 tsp. vanilla

½ tsp. salt

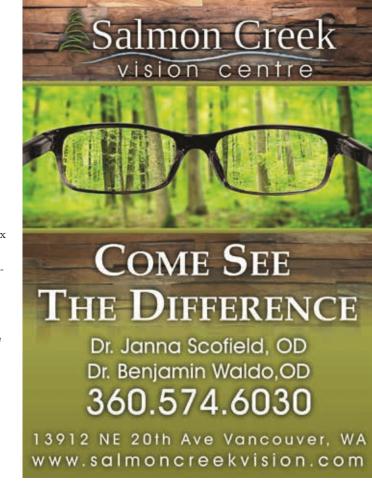
15 oz. caramel

2 cups milk chocolate chips

2 tsp. shortening

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cream butter and sugar together. Add your vanilla, flour, and salt. Mix well. On a lightly floured surface, roll dough out to half an inch thick. To cut cookies, you can use a biscuit cutter or a small glass that is two inches wide. Place round cookies on a lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 for 14-16 minutes. Let cookies cool. Melt caramel and spread the caramel over the cooled cookies. Let caramel cool completely. Add $\,$ your shortening to the chocolate chips and melt in the microwave. Use a microwave-safe bowl and watch so that the chocolate does not burn. Spread melted chocolate over cooled caramel. Let chocolate set before serving. Do not put in the refrigerator, as it will discolor the chocolate.

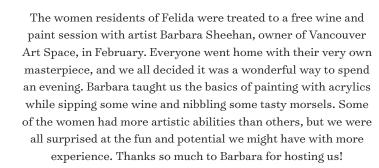
