THE FUTURE OF SAFE

ADVANCED TECHNOLOGIES IN VEHICLE SAFETY

The 2018 Volkswagen Atlas earned five stars in the NHTSA rating and a Top Safety Pick IIHS Rating. Its Automatic Post-Collision Braking System, standard on all models, builds on the premise that a collision is rarely a single, instantaneous action, but rather a series of events that follow the initial impact.



An improved front crash prevention system that now comes standard and headlight improvements put the 2018 Toyota Camry among the vehicles that qualify for the IIHS TOP SAFETY PICK+ award.

ehicles have come a long way with technology designed to prevent and mitigate crashes. Electronic Stability Control, standard on 2012 and later models, is an extension of antilock brake technology that helps drivers maintain control of their vehicles on curves and slippery roads. The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS) reports that ESC lowers the risk of a fatal single-vehicle crash by about half and the risk of a fatal rollover by as much as 80 percent. The life-saving benefits from newer technologies are showing some impressive statistics as well.

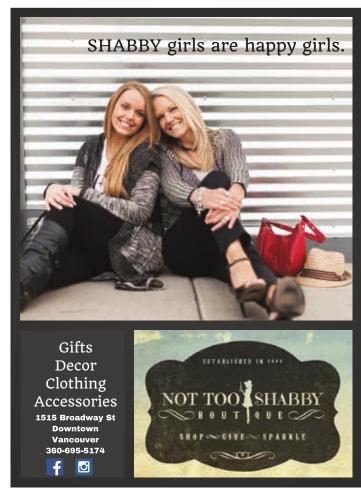


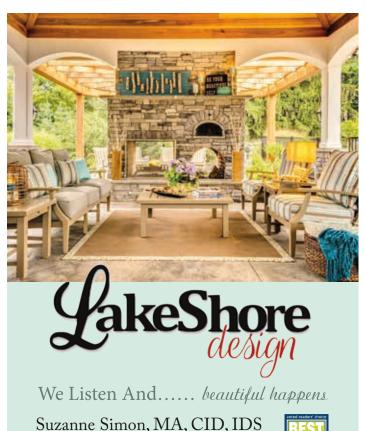
As these technologies advance, the bar is also raised by the organizations that rate vehicle safety. In addition to earning a top rating in traditional crash tests, IIHS now requires collision-avoidance technology and well-rated headlights in order for vehicles to earn its "Top Safety Pick Plus" (TSP+) rating. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's New Car Assessment Program (NCAP) 5-Star Safety Ratings Program says that its testing, which evaluates how vehicles perform in frontal, side and rollover crash tests, has also become more rigorous. Search test results from these organizations at www.iihs.org and www.nhtsa.gov.

While we await fully automated driving (driverless cars) that could eliminate the vast majority of crashes, we can now enjoy the immediate benefits of adaptive cruise control, front crash prevention, lane departure warning, blind spot detection, park assist and backover prevention, which are some of the first steps in that direction. Advances also are being made in intelligent transportation systems that allow vehicles to communicate with one another or with road infrastructure to help avoid crashes.

So, the technology is here, and it's proving its merit; the next step in truly making the roads safer for everyone will be for manufacturers to tackle road safety from a more inclusive perspective, instead of charging extra for safety upgrades. Toyota took the leadership position on this front last year, by making its Toyota Safety Sense™ suite of safety features standard equipment on every model from the compact Yaris to the Land Cruiser.

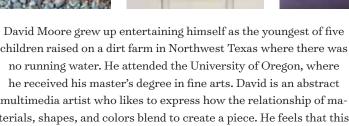

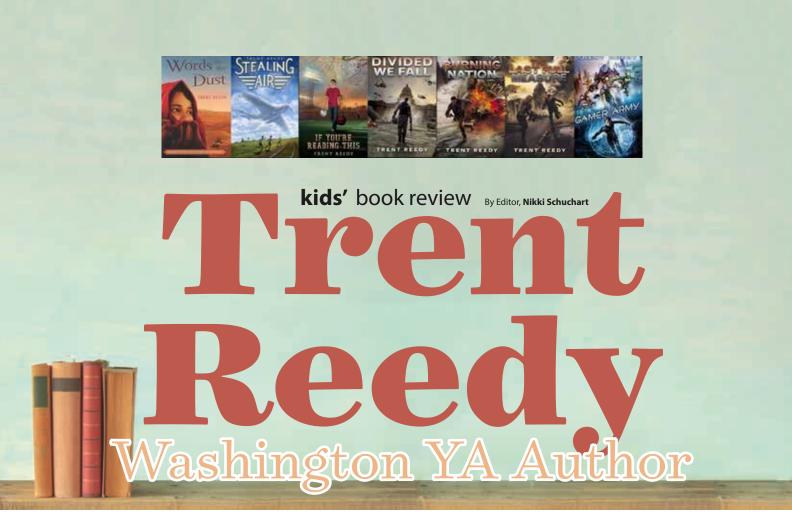
Set Goals And Track Your Progress

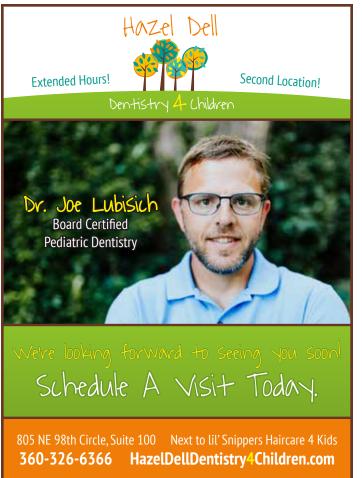

Remodeled With A New Purpose living spaces By resident Carol Collura

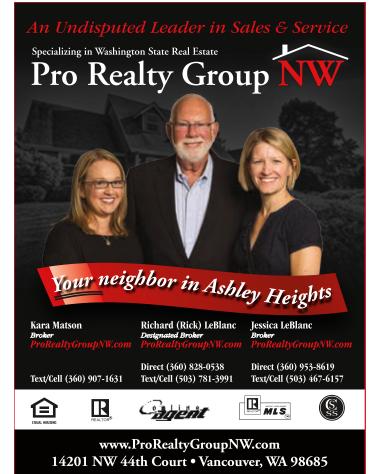

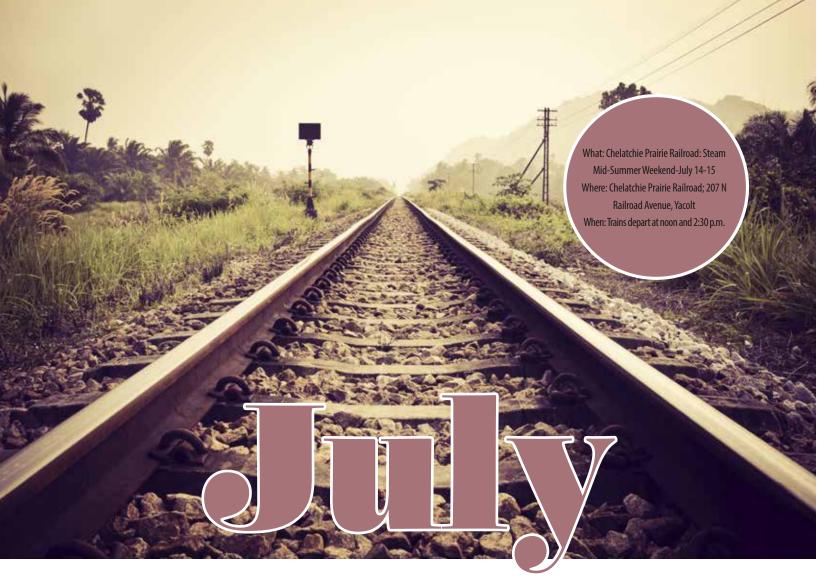
New startups and ideas for helping the less fortunate have always been welcomed and cherished in the Felida community, and the FISH Network is no exception. FISH, which stands for Friends In Service to Humanity, is a group of volunteers that focuses on "feeding families [and] nourishing children." Mark Osborne, who is on the board of directors for FISH, explains some of the impacts FISH has had on the community. He states, "We give out close to 800,000 pounds of food a year to the hungry, the homeless, and what we call 'the food insecure.' We also give out clothing on a limited basis and mostly on an emergency need basis (winter hats and coats). One of our biggest impacts is that we do a lot of partnerships with local elementary schools, helping out with the needy as well as helping out with homes for hungry veterans and the elderly."

While this has had an immensely positive impact on the community, FISH has even bigger goals. "We just hired our first executive director,"

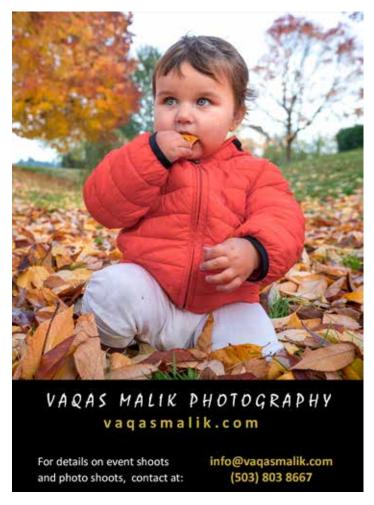
